## Appendix One

### Two Nations, Both Alike in Dignity

*Boom! Boom!* The fireworks crack open in the sky. It's Independence Day, July Fourth, the Fourth of July in 2023, nearly 250 years after July 4, 1776, when America first gained its independence from Britain rule. But is that really true? How much do you actually know about Independence Day?

Despite its name, Independence Day is not when the American colonies gained their sovereign independence from the rule of King George III. That would be September 3, 1783, in which the Treaty of Paris was finally signed, though still a day on which no American holiday is celebrated. Instead, July Fourth is when the Continental Congress passed the Declaration of Independence, announcing the Patriot's separation from the rule of King George III. And yes, while true that this is a day to be thought of as first being free from British rule, all the colonialists had actually done was make known to King George III that they were no longer willing to follow his rule, though announcing separatism is not the same as being the leaders of one's own country. In terms of political geography, the only way to be a sovereign and independent nation is by being recognized by the United Nations (UN) power and veto nations. While the UN didn't exist back in the 1700's, treaties, such as the previously mentioned Treaty of Paris, were used to seal the deal instead.

Since the Declaration of Independence was not a legally binding document, it had no official nor permanent way of renouncing the British reign over the colonies. So while thirteen colonies had announced their separation from British Rule, they were still technically bound to England, hence the Revolutionary War, which was used as a way to formally break away from the rule of King George III, as well as the first official stepping stone to establishing our new nation. However, that is not the only reason as to why Independence Day should not be celebrated on the Fourth of July.

In fact, when celebrating the Declaration of Independence, which is what Independence Day really comes down to, we should actually be focusing on July 2, or more accurately, August 2. July 2 was when fifty-six delegates of the Continental Congress signed the Declaration, and a day in which our second president, John Adams, wrote in a letter to his wife, Abigail, that Independence Day [July 2] would be the most memorable day in all of America. When Independence Day became official in 1977, in which the thirteen colonies were celebrated, festivities began with the firing of thirteen gunshots and the launching closure of thirteen rockets serving as fireworks, John Adams never showed up to any of the Fourth of July events he received an invite to, as he firmly believed in celebrating Independence Day of July 2. Comically, John Adams actually died on the Fourth of July, the same year as his successor President Thomas Jefferson, in 1826, which happened to be the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. The fifth president of the US, a James Monroe, also died on July Fourth, only in 1831. While we lost three of forty-six presidents on a day near to every American's heart, we were also blessed with the birth of 30<sup>th</sup> president Calvin Coolidge on the same holiday in 1872.

As for August 2, this was the day that John Hancock resigned the final copy of the Declaration of Independence, using the large signature we all know today. These events all took place within a span of thirty days, just over a year after when the fighting broke out on April 19, 1775, starting the Revolutionary War.

This, among other reasons, goes to show why the Fourth of July is called Independence Day, and not America Day, whereas the events taking place in Canada, only with slightly different repercussions, hence the opposite name. Only three days earlier than the Fourth, on July 1, is when Canadiens celebrate their day of freedom from the same British rule. Formerly known as Dominion Day until 1982, this was when, in 1867, a dominion, or sovereign act, became official through the British North America Act. This agreement gave Canada autonomy from England, allowing the territories of Nova Scotia, Canada, and New Brunswick to become the first Canadian Provinces. Canada was then split up into Ontario, and Quebec, making these the original four provinces of the current ten.

Until 1982, however, the British rule still had some power over Canada, one of the reasons as to why they are a member of the Commonwealth nation, and why Canada has a national anthem and a royal anthem. A new constitution was put in place in 1982, granting Canada the rights to be a fully independent nation, an event today known as the Constitution Act.

The United States of America and its Northern neighbor, the Dominion of Canada, are both rather similar in more ways than not. In fact, both countries keep the natural features of their nation close at heart. The bald eagle is a bird commonly found throughout North America, though also a symbol of strength, immortality, courage, and freedom. Chosen by founding father Benjamin Franklin, the eagle is a sign of liberty to the American people, as was officially determined in 1782. The liberty bell, another sign of freedom to American's, also has strong ties to Independence Day, as it rings thirteen times every Fourth of July in honor of the thirteen original colonies of the United States. As for Canada, the Canadian flag is actually based off of some of the natural traits that make their nation recognizable. The white in the Canadian flag is represented by the white Winter snow, and the red maple leaf and stripes have to do with the autumnal color of Canada's many maple leaves.

The United States flag, however, has much to do with symbolism, and little to do with nature. Designed by Francis Hopkinson and sewn by Betsy Ross on June 14, 1777, the red and white stripes represent the thirteen original colonies, each of which were originally in a circle to show equality. The fifty stars on today flag stand for each of the fifty states, arranged in the pattern we know today. The traditional colors of red, white, and blue each have symbolic meanings. The red symbolizes valor and hardiness, the blue for perseverance, justice, and vigilance, and the white for innocence and purity.

Either way, both Canada and the United States have many reasons to celebrate their freedom and loyalty to their country early on in the month of July. Whichever holiday festivities you'll be taking part in, remember to think about our neighbor, who worked just as hard as we did to gain their autonomy, and to allow their people to be under a leader whom they believe in.
